When: Friday, June 3, 2005

Where: Sites across Montgomery, Greene and Preble Counties.

Who: Volunteer teams from local companies provide the manpower and elbow grease to get the job done for agencies and clients who lack the resources to complete them on their own.

What do I have to do to be a part of Community Care Day?

- ✔ Obtain approval from your company/supervisor to be out-of-the-office on June 3, 2005.
 - Full-day and half-day projects are available.
 - If you can't be gone all day, see if you can send your volunteers in shifts throughout the day.
- ✔ Assemble your project team and decide what type of project your team is interested in working on.
 - Projects will be chosen on a first-come-first serve basis. Your campaign manager has a list of projects.
 - Projects include: painting, landscaping, cleaning, light construction, sorting/organizing items such as toys, books, etc. and spending time with agency clients.
- ✔ Contact your United Way campaign manager and tell them you are ready to help!
- ✔ Make plans for lunch
 - Volunteers are responsible for bringing their own lunches. Many companies provide lunch for their project teams.
- ✔ Order your official 2005 Community Care Day t-shirt.
 - Exact t-shirt prices will be available closer to the event date, but will be between \$10 and \$12 each, depending on size.
 - Many companies purchase Community Care Day t-shirts for their teams.
